History and Art Intersect

A rtist Curtis Goldstein began painting the murals for Licking County Library's future garage for some of its mobile fleet in early August. He has been planning the design with Deputy Fiscal Officer Kerrill Foster since 2019, and since then has developed a concept that brings Licking County's history to life. "Visuals help make [history] publicly accessible," explains Goldstein. He was chosen after reviewing a couple of different artists, and later a grant from the Downtown Newark Preservation and Rehabilitation Program was received by the Library to help with the cost.

The mural on the west side of the building is called *Facing Future*, a tribute to the album title of a favorite singer of Goldstein's, Hawaiian artist Israel Kamakawiwo'ole. The album features cover songs about nature, as well as traditional songs combined with Kamakawiwo'ole's self-penned compositions about modern times.

Focusing on a movement through time, the design starts with prehistory and moves up to modern technology. Goldstein believes that the parallels between ancient people's lives and modern living can provide contemplation about human nature and our relationship with the natural world. The arrows and blades of the Hopewell culture's tools juxtaposed with trains and planes of more recent inventions help to accomplish this idea. These developments in technology have an impact in our natural landscape as well, symbolized in the mural by the Burning Tree Mastodon, Earthwork mounds and Black Hand Gorge.



Artist Reception and History Talk November 3, 2022 5:30pm | Downtown Newark

The east side mural is more about the educational connections to Licking County. It features portraits of six important authors, poets, and scientists that made contributions to local history and development. Another main feature of this side is the large,

cascading arch of books from one end to the other. The rendering of books will change from section to section of the mural to fit the different coloration and styles of the design. In doing so, it might take on a slight rainbow effect. Also, each book represents



Licking County Library gathered input from its patrons on what titles or authors they would like added to the painted book spines, furthering the community value of the mural. Rather than creating a linear timeline like the east side mural, this side encompasses the many areas of culture that these women helped develop. Ranging from children's story authors, to mathematicians and paleontologists, these portraits and their illustrative sections display the impact that reading and education can have.

Tolkien's early years saw a good deal of trauma: the loss of both parents, serious illness, poverty, and battlefield action during World War I, including the loss of close friends. Yet Tolkien presents an enchanted world view in the stories of Middle-earth. That tension between enchantment and disenchantment lies at the very heart of Tolkien's creative endeavors.
